The Commission received an Administrative Complaint filed by the Alabama State Board of Medical Examiners. A motion was made by Commissioner Alsip with a second by Commissioner Morris to enter an order setting a hearing for July 24, 2024. The motion was approved by unanimous vote. Michael D. Dick, M.D.

The Commission considered a motion filed on behalf of Dr. Dick to lift the order temporarily suspending his Alabama medical license. A motion was made by Commissioner Alsip with a second by Commissioner Morris to deny Dr. Dick's request to lift the temporary suspension of his Alabama medical license. The motion was approved by unanimous vote. A copy of the Commission's order is attached hereto as Exhibit "D".

Mark Koch, D.O.

The Commission considered a motion filed on behalf of Dr. Koch to remove restrictions placed on his Alabama medical license. A motion was made by Commissioner Alsip with a second by Commissioner Aldridge to defer any action and to place the request on the May 29, 2024 Commission agenda for consideration. The motion was approved by unanimous vote.

Divya A. Carrigan, M.D.

The Commission received an Administrative Complaint and Petition for Summary Suspension filed by the Alabama State Board of Medical Examiners. A motion was made by Commissioner Alsip with a second by Commissioner Nagrodzki to enter an order summarily suspending Dr. Carrigan's license to practice medicine in Alabama and setting a hearing for July 24, 2024. The motion was approved by unanimous vote. A copy of the Commission's order is attached hereto as Exhibit "E".

Amjad Butt, M.D.

At the conclusion of the hearing, a motion was made by Commissioner Alsip with a second by Commissioner Aldridge to deny Dr. Butt's request to lift the restrictions placed on his Alabama medical license. The motion was approved by unanimous vote. A copy of the Commission's order is attached hereto as Exhibit "F".

Kristin Dobay, M.D.

At the conclusion of the hearing, a motion was made by Commissioner Aldridge with a second by Commissioner Nelson-Garrett to issue an order approving the issuance and restricting Dr. Dobay's Alabama medical license. Among other requirements, the order requires that a practice plan must be approved by the Commission prior to Dr. Dobay's practice of medicine. The order restricts Dr. Dobay from solo practice and requires structured preceptorship. Dr. Dobay may only practice obstetrics and gynecology and shall commence recertification with the American Board of Obstetrics and Gynecology. The Board's Physician Monitor will monitor his practice for a minimum of one year and Dr. Dobay shall continue psychotherapy with monthly reports to the Commission. Dr. Dobay is restricted from the supervision of Family Practice residents. The motion was approved by unanimous vote. Dr. Christopher took no part in the deliberation or decision of this matter, and Mr. Dettling took no part in the preparation of the Commission's findings. A copy of the Commission's order is attached hereto as Exhibit "G".

The parties may request that the Hearing Officer issue subpoenas for witnesses and/or documents, and the Hearing Officer is authorized to approve and issue such subpoenas on behalf of the Commission. Service of such subpoenas shall be the responsibility of the party requesting such subpoenas.

15. Hearing Exhibits

- A. Parties and attorneys should, if possible, stipulate as to the admissibility of documents prior to the hearing.
- B. The use of electronic technology, USB drives, CD's, DVD's, etc. is acceptable and encouraged for voluminous records. If the Commission members will need their laptop to view documents, please notify the Hearing Officer prior to your hearing.
- C. If providing hard copies, voluminous records need not be copied for everyone but, if portions of records are to be referred to, those portions should be copied for everyone.
- D. If a document is to be referred to in a hearing, copies should be available for each Commission member, the Hearing Officer, the Commission's General Counsel, opposing attorney, and the court reporter (12 copies).
- E. Index exhibits/documents for easy reference.
- F. Distribute exhibit/document packages at the beginning of the hearing to minimize distractions during the hearing.

16. Administrative Costs

The Commission is authorized, pursuant to Ala. Code § 34-24-381(b) and Ala. Admin. Code r. 545-X-3-.08(9) and (10), to assess administrative costs against the Respondent if he or she is found guilty of any of the grounds for discipline set forth in Ala. Code § 34-24-360. The Board of Medical Examiners [X]has / []has not given written notice of its intent to seek imposition of administrative costs in this matter.

17. Appeals

Appeals from final decisions of the Medical Licensure Commission, where permitted, are governed by Ala. Code § 34-24-367.

ORDER

This matter is before the Medical Licensure Commission of Alabama on Respondent's request to lift the restrictions on his license imposed by our Orders of July 31, 2015 and October 13, 2016. The Board, on November 27, 2023, filed a written statement of its reasons for opposing Respondent's request. Pursuant to the provisions of Ala. Code § 34-24-361(h)(9), on April 24, 2024, the Commission held an evidentiary hearing on this matter at which Respondent testified and was represented by counsel.

A brief overview of the procedural history of this matter is in order. Based on an Administrative Complaint filed by the Board, on March 27, 2013, we entered an order summarily suspending Respondent's license to practice medicine in Alabama and setting this matter for a contested case hearing. Based on the evidence presented at that hearing, on November 20, 2013, we entered findings of fact and conclusions of law. In those findings, we found that Respondent's care of at least five patients fell below the minimum standard of care expected of physicians in this State. Those failures led to

the deaths of four of those five patients. Based on those findings, we revoked Respondent's license to practice medicine, stayed the revocation, and imposed "indefinite" terms of probation.

Those terms of probation—as amended and memorialized in subsequent orders dated July 31, 2015 and October 13, 2016—provide, among other things, that Respondent is prohibited from performing invasive cardiology procedures. The prohibited procedures include, but are not limited to, "angiography, catheterization, and peripheral invasive procedures." Our orders also prohibit Respondent from practicing medicine in Alabama except pursuant to an approved practice plan, which includes at least "the location of the intended practice, the names and pertinent information regarding other physicians in the practice, the precise nature of the expected practice, including the number of hours expected to be worked, and any expected hospital affiliation."

Respondent has requested that the Commission modify or remove the conditions of probation at least 10 times. We have denied those requests by orders dated February 6, 2015, September 10, 2015, March 4, 2016, April 5, 2016, August 5, 2016, September 7, 2018, October 7, 2018, November 29, 2019, April 28, 2020, and June 7, 2021.

In our orders of September 7 and October 7, 2018, we specified conditions under which we would consider granting relief from the probationary restrictions: "The Commission will consider lifting restrictions on Dr. Butt's license upon his completion of an ACGME-approved cardiac fellowship in interventional cardiology; upon his

further showing that he is competent to practice in the restricted areas; and upon a

showing that his payment of any outstanding fines and costs have been paid."

Respondent has not demonstrated that he has completed an ACGME-approved

cardiac fellowship in interventional cardiology. More importantly, though, Respondent

has made no showing that he is competent to practice in the area of interventional

cardiology.

Upon review of all relevant circumstances of this case, and upon consideration

of Respondent's testimony, the Commission concludes that the license restrictions

imposed by our Orders of July 31, 2015 and October 13, 2016 remain necessary to

protect public safety.

Accordingly, Respondent's request to alter, amend, or vacate the license

restrictions is DENIED.

FINDINGS OF FACT AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

This matter came before the Medical Licensure Commission of Alabama ("Commission") for a contested case hearing regarding initial licensure on April 24, 2024.

I. Introduction and Statement of the Case

Kristin Josef Dobay, M.D. ("Respondent") applied for an Alabama medical license on June 26, 2023. His license application, supporting documents, and documents admitted into evidence detailed the September 18, 2019, voluntary surrender of his license to practice medicine in the state of Tennessee, the November 18, 2021, reinstatement of his Tennessee license with conditions, and the January 5, 2023, denial of Dr. Dobay's reinstatement application by the Kentucky Board of Medical Examiners. The Alabama Board of Medical Examiners ("Board") issued a Certificate of Qualifications to Dr. Dobay on

October 26, 2023, after he signed a Voluntary Agreement placing certain restrictions on his practice of medicine in Alabama.

II. Procedural History

On October 26, 2023, the Board issued Respondent a Certificate of Qualification after he signed a Voluntary Agreement with the Board to limit his practice to obstetrics and gynecology and not engage in the treatment of weight loss or chronic pain.

The Commission considered Respondent's licensure application during its January 24, 2024, meeting and determined that this matter was due to be set down for hearing under the provisions of Ala. Code §§ 34-24-333(a) and 41-22-19(a) (1975).

The Commission's Order dated February 9, 2024, served as the Notice of Hearing prescribed in Ala. Admin. Code r. 545-X-3-.03(3), (4) (MLC). The Commission's legal authority and jurisdiction to hold the hearing in this matter are granted by Article 8, Chapter 24, Title 34 of the Code of Alabama (1975), and the applicable statutes and administrative rules are set forth in the Commission and Board_Administrative Codes and this order.

In contested cases, the Alabama Administrative Procedure Act requires a division of responsibilities between the prosecutorial and adjudicatory functions

of the agency. See Ala. Code § 41-22-18(a). Accordingly, the Commission designated Commission Chairman Craig H. Christopher, MD, and Commission General Counsel Aaron L. Detling as the prosecutorial team for the purposes of this hearing. Dr. Christopher and Mr. Dettling presented the facts and argument relevant to the Respondent's application for licensure, and neither participated in the deliberation, decision, or preparation of the findings in connection with this matter.

The Chairman and General Counsel's Statement of Contentions, which was duly served with the Commission and Respondent's counsel on February 24, 2024, included the following potential reasons for denying, restricting, or conditioning the issuance of a medical license to Respondent:

- 1. Whether Respondent has exhibited a pattern of conduct inconsistent with the standards of licensure of physicians in the State of Alabama, including but not limited to multiple arrests for driving under the influence of alcohol;
- 2. Whether the Respondent is clinically competent to practice medicine. He has been absent for more than two years, and this absence from practice triggers the rebuttable presumption of clinical incompetence under Ala. Code § 34-24-360(20) (1975) and Ala. Admin. Code r. 540-X-23-.03(1) (ABME);

- 3. Whether Respondent has exhibited a pattern of deceit and deception in the practice of medicine inconsistent with the standards of licensure of physicians in the State of Alabama;
- 4. Whether Respondent has engaged in unethical conduct in the practice of medicine, including, but not limited to, prescribing or providing controlled substances to an individual with whom he had an intimate relationship for other than a legitimate medical purpose and/or, at a minimum, making possible the diversion of substantial quantities of controlled substances by pre-signing blank prescription forms contrary to federal law;
- 5. Whether Respondent has exhibited a pattern of disruptive behavior exhibiting a potential untreated personality disorder negatively impacting Respondent's fitness to practice medicine with reasonable skill and safety to patients; and,
- 6. Whether Respondent's multiple professional evaluations over the last five years exhibit a pattern of reduction of personal responsibility and blaming others for professional lapses, indicating a lack of insight into personal and professional shortcomings and/or lack of good moral character.

On April 24, 2024, we conducted a full evidentiary hearing as prescribed in Ala. Admin. Code r. 545-X-3-.01 et seq. (MLC). Dr. Christopher and Mr. Detling presented the case challenging the Respondent's licensure application.

Mr. Fox DeMoisey represented the Respondent. The Commission offered each side the opportunity to present evidence and argument in support of its respective contentions and to cross-examine the witnesses presented by the other side. After careful review, we have made our independent and collective judgments regarding the weight and credibility to give the evidence, and the fair and reasonable inferences to be drawn from it. Having done so, and as prescribed in Ala. Code § 41-22-16, we enter the following Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law.

Commission Vice-Chairman, Jorge A. Alsip, MD, and the Commission's Hearing Officer, the Honorable William R. Gordon, presided at the hearing and prepared the Commission's written findings.

III. Findings of Fact

We find the following facts to be established by the preponderance of the evidence presented at the hearing:

- 1. Respondent became licensed to practice medicine in Tennessee in 2009 and was licensed to practice medicine in Kentucky from 2003 to 2013.
- 2. In 2011, following an arrest in Hopkinsville, Kentucky, for multiple charges, including Driving Under the Influence (DUI), Respondent underwent an evaluation at the Vanderbilt Comprehensive Assessment Program ("VCAP"),

where he was diagnosed with Alcohol Abuse and determined to be unfit to practice medicine without conditions or limitations.

- 3. On December 7, 2018, Respondent was arrested for DUI a second time in Hopkinsville, Kentucky.
- 4. On December 10, 2018, Respondent voluntarily refrained from practicing at TriStar Centennial Medical Center (Nashville), and TriStar suspended his privileges on December 10, 2018.
- 5. On December 12, 2018, the St. Thomas (Nashville) Medical Executive Committee suspended Respondent's clinical privileges.
- 6. Between January 2019 and October 2022, a period of less than five years, Respondent was assessed for boundary and/or substance use issues eight times at multiple facilities.
- 7. Dr. Sandra Frazier, Medical Director of the Alabama Professionals
 Health Program, advocates for Respondent, and both sides have stipulated that
 Respondent is currently doing well in his recovery from alcohol use disorder.
- 8. Respondent testified that he used another physician's pre-signed blank prescriptions on or about May 19, 2019, to prescribe the following controlled substances for his intimate partner: Ritalin, clonazepam, gabapentin, Abilify, and Depakote. Respondent stated the other physician authorized this;

however, the other physician denied this to the Tennessee Board of Medical Examiners.

- 9. Respondent testified that he signed multiple blank prescription forms for use by an addiction treatment program's non-physician staff to prescribe controlled substances when Respondent was not onsite. He further testified that several of these prescriptions were subsequently stolen and used by others to obtain controlled substances illicitly.
- 10. Respondent testified he has not practiced medicine since the September 18, 2019, surrender of his Tennessee medical license.
- 11. On September 12, 2022, Respondent submitted to a neuropsychological and clinical skills assessment performed by LifeGuard. The October 10, 2022, LifeGuard report stated, "There are no cognitive contraindications to" Respondent returning to practice. However, the LifeGuard assessment did not include an evaluation of his surgical or procedural skills. The board-certified OB/GYN who administered the oral case presentations stated she would "anticipate that he would engage, given his time away from clinical work, in a period of supervised clinical practice."

IV. Conclusions of Law

- 1. The Medical Licensure Commission of Alabama has jurisdiction over the subject matter of this contested case proceeding under 1981 Ala. Acts 218, Ala. Code §§ 34-24-310, et seq. The Commission has the power to determine whether there is "good and reasonable cause for refusing to issue" a license to Respondent to practice medicine or osteopathy in the State of Alabama within the meaning of Ala. Code § 34-24-333(a), and whether a license to practice medicine should be denied, issued, or issued with restrictions and/or conditions of probation based upon the totality of the relevant facts and circumstances.
- 2. The Commission properly notified the Respondent of the time, date, and place of the administrative hearing and the contentions regarding his licensure application in compliance with Ala. Admin. Code r. 545-X-4-.10 (MLC).
- 3. Based on the findings -- particularly Finding of Fact No. 9 we conclude that Respondent pre-signed blank prescription forms and made them available to employees and support personnel in an addiction treatment clinic, which is a violation under Ala. Admin. Code r. 540-X-4-.06(5), (8) (ABME).
- 4. Based on the findings -- particularly Findings of Fact No. 8 we conclude that Respondent prescribed multiple controlled substances for a patient using a prescription form that had been pre-signed by another physician, which is a violation under Ala. Admin. Code r. 540-X-4-.06(1)(e) (ABME).

- 5. <u>Based on the findings</u> particularly Finding of Fact Nos. 8, 9, 11—we conclude that Respondent is incompetent to practice obstetrics and gynecology in an unsupervised practice setting under Ala. Admin. Code r. 540-X-23-.03(2c 4.)
- 6. We reach these conclusions based on all the evidence presented, viewed through the lens of our professional experience and specialized knowledge of the practice of medicine. See Ala. Code § 41-22-13(5) ("The experience, technical competence, and specialized knowledge of the agency may be utilized in the evaluation of the evidence.").

V. Decision

Based on all of the foregoing, the Commission determines, therefore, that the license to practice medicine in the State of Alabama is due to be and hereby is issued to Kristin Josef Dobay, M.D., subject to the following restrictions:

- (1) Dr. Dobay shall enter into, maintain, and fully comply with a lifetime monitoring contract with the Alabama Physicians' Health Program.
- (2) Dr. Dobay may practice medicine in Alabama only pursuant to a written practice plan submitted to, and approved in advance by, the Commission. A practice plan will contain, at a minimum, specific information regarding: the proposed name of the employer; the proposed scope of practice or type of services he will provide; the proposed days/hours of work; typical patient populations of the proposed practice; the name of Respondent's proposed preceptor; and specifically, how the

preceptor will be involved in monitoring and mentoring Respondent in his return to the practice of medicine.

- (3) Dr. Dobay is not approved for solo practice and must practice in a clinic with at least one other physician. At least one physician in the practice, besides Dr. Dobay, must be credentialed by the medical staff of a local hospital to provide inpatient obstetric and gynecologic services.
- (4) Dr. Dobay must engage in a structured preceptorship meeting the following requirements:
 - (a) The preceptorship will be designed, implemented, supervised, and documented by LifeGuard to conduct a robust evaluative process of Dr. Dobay's clinical acumen and hands-on care, including proficiency in gynecological surgery, obstetrics, deliveries, and office-based care, including office procedures;
 - (b) The preceptorship may be terminated after six (6) months if the preceptor determines Dr. Dobay possesses the clinical competence and proficiency to perform gynecological surgery, obstetrics, deliveries, and office-based care, including office procedures;
 - (c) LifeGuard shall provide vetting of the supervising physician ("preceptor"), and he or she must be approved by both LifeGuard and the Commission;
 - (d) The preceptor and LifeGuard must make reports to the Commission every month, and the reports must include the number of procedures performed, complications, if any, assessments of clinical competency, recommendations by LifeGuard, and other matters deemed pertinent by LifeGuard; and

- (e) After the preceptorship's conclusion, LifeGuard will provide a final report to the Commission summarizing Dr. Dobay's performance during the preceptorship and setting forth any further recommendations for his professional development.
- (5) Dr. Dobay will only practice obstetrics and gynecology, and will not practice chronic pain management, Medically Assisted Treatment, or weight loss treatment.
- (6) Dr. Dobay will not apply for an Alabama Medical Cannabis Certification (AMCC) Permit.
- (7) The Board's Physician Monitor should monitor Dr. Dobay's practice for a minimum of one year, including interviews with Labor & Delivery and surgical staff nurses, supervisors, and hospital administrative staff to ensure a satisfactory work environment.
- (8) Dr. Dobay's work hours, excluding call, will be limited to 40 hours per week.
- (9) Dr. Dobay shall continue psychotherapy on at least a monthly basis by a therapist approved by the Commission and with experience in treating physicians with distressed or disruptive behavior, with quarterly reports to the Commission.
- (10) Dr. Dobay shall commence the American Board of Obstetrics and Gynecology's recertification process and shall make quarterly reports of his progress to the Board's Physician Monitor.
- (11) Dr. Dobay shall not participate in the supervision of Family Practice residents until he is determined to be competent to practice independently by LifeGuard and the Commission.

(12) If the relationship between Dr. Dobay and LifeGuard is terminated by either party, Dr. Dobay must obtain the Commission's approval to have a different physician assessment and education organization perform the services required by this order.
