COMMISSIONERS RE-APPOINTED TO NEW TERMS

In May 2025, Medical Licensure Commission members Nina P. Nelson-Garrett, MD, and Pamela D. Varner, MD, were reappointed to five-year terms.

The eight members of the Commission consist of seven doctors of medicine or osteopathy licensed to practice in Alabama and one public member. They are appointed to staggered five-year terms by the Lieutenant Governor (two appointments), the Speaker of the House of Representatives (two), and the Governor (three, including one public member). There are no limits to the number of terms to which a Commissioner may be appointed.

New Recommended Guidelines for Testosterone Therapy in Males and Females

Recommended guidelines for testosterone therapy in males and females were approved by the Alabama Board of Medical Examiners on February 20, 2025.



Symptomatic Men

Only symptomatic men with demonstrably abnormal serum testosterone levels **below 300ng/dl** confirmed on subsequent morning lab evaluations should be considered for testosterone therapy after exclusion of other related medical conditions.



Contraindictions

All candidates for testosterone therapy should be screened for contraindications **prior to** initiating testosterone therapy.

Examples of **contraindications** in men: Desire to maintain sufficient quality and quantity of sperm production for future fertility, active prostate cancer, cardiac arrythmia

Examples of **contraindications** in women: hepatic disease and hyperlipidemia



Treatment for Women

Transdermal treatment provides the most physiological form of replacement therapy for women, administered as a gel.

Testosterone implants, which may result in supraphysiological levels and do not allow for dose titration, are **not recommended**.

IM injections and oral preparations are **not recommended**, owing to the adverse effects related to short-term safety.

Lowest Effective Dose

- Adhere to the philosophy of "lowest effective dose" when prescribing testosterone replacement therapy.
- Current data supports the short-term efficacy and safety of low dose testosterone therapy to achieve high levels in the normal/premenopausal range in postmenopausal women with sexual dysfunction due to HSDD.

Telehealth

• After initial evaluation, male patients should undergo a 3-month visit with lab studies and must be seen in person annually by a physician. Telehealth is not an acceptable visit to qualify as a managing physician visit.

Not Recommended

 The general use of testosterone in women for infertility; sexual dysfunction other than HSDD; cognitive, cardiovascular, metabolic, or bone health; depression; or general well-being is not recommended.

Safety

- Any woman receiving testosterone therapy should be monitored every 6 months for signs and symptoms of androgen excess.
- After initiation in men, repeat serum testosterone, H/H, and PSA levels should be checked at 3 months by a physician.

REMINDER: MANDATORY PROFESSIONAL BOUNDARIES EDUCATION MUST BE COMPLETED BY DEC. 31

History: In 2020, a joint consultant group of the Board and Commission studied the increasing number of sexual misconduct and professional boundaries complaints against Alabama medical practitioners and what measures should be taken to address this increase.

As part of the continuing effort to protect the health and safety of patients and educate licensees, mandatory professional boundaries education is being implemented for all physicians, physician assistants, and anesthesiologist assistants licensed in Alabama. The only licensees exempted from this requirement are limited licensees who are enrolled in a residency training program or a clinical fellowship.

Current Licensees: Effective January 2025, all actively licensed physicians, physician assistants,

and anesthesiologist assistants are required to complete the two-hour on-demand course provided by PBI Education entitled "Navigating Professional Boundaries in Medicine." The course is provided free of charge to all Alabama licensees and must be completed by December 31, 2025.

Frequently Asked Questions

I took this course for another state license; do I have to take this course?

Yes, the only Alabama licensees exempt from this one-time requirement are physicians with limited licenses who are enrolled in a postgraduate training program.

Our course was tailored for Alabama licensees, with links to Alabama laws and rules, which may differ from other states.

I received a postcard about this requirement, but I was unsure if it was really from the Board/Commission.

Postcards were sent from our offices in groups during the months of February to the present, notifying all licensees of the new requirement. It directed licensees to this webpage which contains a link to the course. This is an external link to PBI Education, who is hosting the CME module.

I am retired/currently not practicing in Alabama, am I still required to take the course?

Yes. All physicians licensed to practice medicine in Alabama and all assistants to physicians licensed to practice in Alabama are subject to this one-time requirement, with the sole exception of physicians with limited licenses who are enrolled in residency or fellowship programs.




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BME/MLC AND PBI CO-PRESENT POSTER SERIES ON PREVENTING BOUNDARY VIOLATIONS

At the 2025 Federation of State Medical Boards meeting in April, Alabama Board of Medical Examiners Associate General Counsel, Effie Hawthorne, copresented a poster series on our ongoing initiative with PBI Education to provide free preventative continuing medical education focusing on boundary violations and sexual misconduct in the medical profession.

We and PBI Education recognize the need for healthcare professionals to become educated in this area to avoid pitfalls and protect the safety of patients.

Breaking the Cycle of Sexual Misconduct Through Preventive CME

Alabama Board of Medical Examiners (ALBME), Alabama Medical Licensure Commission (ALMLC), and PBI Education

Identifying the Problem

The ALBME/ALMLC identified a troubling trend - a rising number of sexual misconduct and professional boundaries complaints. They began to study what measures could be taken proactively to address the increase.

Developing a Solution

Through the rule-making process, the ALBME required all licensees to complete a CME course on professional boundaries. This education would help licensees identify and prevent violations in both themselves and in other providers, in order to safeguard the public. The course, "Navigating Professional Boundaries in Health Care (DR-2)", was customized and delivered in partnership with PBI Education, an expert in professional boundaries and clinician remediation, and provided at no cost to licensees.



Examples of Other Regulatory Initiatives Working to Reduce Boundary Violations:

Ohio: In 2019, the State Medical Board of Ohio prioritized understanding sexual misconduct complaints and has put in place measures to protect Ohio residents from sexual misconduct.

Georgia: In 2021, the Georgia Composite Medical Board mandated licensees and board members complete two hours of CME regarding professional boundaries and physician sexual misconduct, via House Bill 458.

New Jersey: In 2021, the NJ Division of Consumer Affairs called upon the New Jersey Board of Medical Examiners to develop a proposal for mandatory continuing education on sexual misconduct prevention, bystander intervention, and human trafficking prevention.

FSMB Foundation: In 2025, the FSMB Foundation will complete an educational video to provide information for physicians, physicians-intraining, and the public on the importance of professional boundaries and how they are maintained.

Upon successful completion of the course, participants submit a post-course evaluation form. The following data are compiled from those responses:


Navigating Professional Boundaries in Health Care Course (DR-2)

Analysis Period: January 1, 2025 - March 12, 2025

Participants: n = 2583 physicians, physician assistants, and anesthesiologist assistants licensed by Alabama

In the post-course evaluation, 1,260 (48.7%) answered the optional question, "How will you change your clinical practice as a result of this course?" Responses appear below:
